#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

Citizen Petition #2017-04 was received on July 17, 2017, regarding Wayside Horns Inequity; Diminished Quality of Life. The Petition requests removal of wayside horns at Fanning Drive and Steves Boulevard railroad crossings and replacing each with "quiet zone" crossings similar to the other 3 in-town crossings (see attached Petition). Council's Future Agenda Item Request (FAIR) discussion on August 15, 2017 is all that is required to comply with Section 17 - Consideration of Petitions of the Flagstaff Charter.



- Flagstaff Designated Quiet Zone March 2010
  - Trains are directed to stop routine horn use
  - Train horns may still be used in certain situations
    - Trespassing
    - Wildlife
    - Maintenance work or Crossing Warning System malfunction
  - Improved quality of life for all citizens
- Five Railroad Grade Crossings throughout Flagstaff
  - Fanning Drive
  - Steves Boulevard
  - Ponderosa Parkway
  - San Francisco Street
  - Beaver Street

- Supplemental Safety Measures for Quiet Zones 49 CFR 222.43
  - Medians to prevent gate circumnavigation
  - Four-Quadrant Gate System
  - Converting a two-way street into a one-way street
  - Permanent closure of crossing
  - Wayside horns



- Flagstaff's Five Grade Crossings
  - Fanning Drive → Wayside horns
  - Steves Boulevard → Wayside horns
  - Ponderosa Parkway → Medians
  - San Francisco Street → One-way street
  - Beaver Street → One-way street

- Wayside Horns
  - Train-activated, sound device directed at traffic
  - Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) requires
    - A minimum horn volume of 92 decibels (dB) at 100 feet;
       maximum horn volume of 110 dB
    - Standard Train Horn is 110-120 dB at 100 feet
    - Examples of noise at 90-100 dB include:
      - Power Mower
      - Motorcycle
      - Garbage Truck
      - Jackhammer
      - Large aircraft 6080 feet from landing

  - Assembled Team of knowledgeable representatives to evaluate conditions and make recommendations for each crossing
  - Previous Diagnostic Team:
    - City of Flagstaff
    - BNSF Railway
    - Arizona Corporation Commission
    - Arizona Department of Transportation


- Options to Consider
  - Reprogram Current Transportation Tax
    - Commission and Council recommendations
  - Incorporate into Transportation Tax 2020-2040
    - Commission and Council recommendations
  - Identify Other Funding Sources
  - Allocate funding for selected Supplemental Safety Measures
    - Medians (\$100K-\$300K per crossing)
      - 100-ft medians, required by FRA, are too long for crossings
      - 60-foot medians could be accommodated;
         needs Diagnostic Team approval
    - Four-Quadrant Gate System (\$600K-\$800K per crossing)
    - Wayside Horns remain as-is (No cost)








Discussion of Fiscal Year (FY) 2019 Council Budget Priorities

### STAFF RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Council direction.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

During the annual City council budget retreat which occurred on December 12, 2017, Councilmembers provided input with respect to their priorities for the FY19 budget. These priorities coincide with, and further, Council's Goals and Objectives which it formally adopted during the regular council meeting of November 21, 2017. During the council meeting of December 19th, Council continued its discussion of the FY19 budget priorities and developed the attached list of priorities that are broken down by goal.

During the council work session of January 9th, Council will further consider, discuss, and ultimately give direction to city staff on its FY19 budget priorities. The City Manager will then utilize these priorities as a framework upon which to build the FY19 Manager's Recommended Budget. Staff will be coming back to Council during the February budget retreat with ideas, options, and alternatives for how to actualize the Council's priorities in the context of the FY19 budget.

### **Council Priorities for FY 2019 Budget**

### 1. Economic Development

- Address impacts from development/tourism (i.e., trash, traffic, etc.) in a multi-division effort
- Expand outreach to Mexican market with a multi-season focus
- Work with Downtown Business Alliance (DBA) in other areas of Flagstaff (i.e., 4th Street Corridor) to strengthen businesses
- Explore options (i.e., farming, solar energy, etc.) for large parcel revenue production (i.e., Red Gap)
- Impacts of Economic Development on Affordable Housing

### 2. Affordable Housing

- Affordable Housing bond question and continued community dialogue (comprehensive revolving fund consideration)
- Examine ECONA report recommendations with staff recommendations next steps
- Explore more subsidies/incentives to increase the number of affordable homes (including agreements with developers)
- Revisit our current stock and determine current best uses (redevelopment options, etc.)
- Improve/strengthen path from rental to ownership of homes
- Create partnerships (i.e., United Way) for relocations such as for those impacted by the closure of trailer parks
- Subsidize new infrastructure (i.e., sewer, etc.) for Affordable Housing and receive agreements with the development community

#### 3. Social Justice

- ICF Strategic Plan funding consideration
- Indigenous community marketing funds to produce an event (i.e., pow-wow)
- Improve relationship between Mexican Consulate and City (i.e., staff time, insurance, rental fees)
- Explore expanding cultural awareness training to other City staff
- Address lack of downtown public restrooms staff plan and recommendations
- Explore ongoing funding revenue sources to support programming for those with disabilities in the community
- Address social impacts (i.e., public safety) of the daytime needs of the homeless and loitering community and facilities explore options from CJCC, etc.
- Additional staff/funding for social service issues

### 4. Transportation and Other Public Infrastructure

- Revisit impact fees (align with needs of the community)
- Wayside Horns community policy development and budget discussion
- Support Courthouse funding options (i.e., IGA, building proposals, etc.)
- Core Facility completion emphasis
- Explore the Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) what does future look like
- Additional equipment for Fleet (i.e., plows, graders, etc.) levels of service (i.e., snow removal, bulk trash, etc.)
- Actively advocate for infrastructure projects at the State/Federal level (i.e., lobbyist) to get the programmed money into our community
- Continue working towards 75% recycle rate
- Add infrastructure to open up city lands for development
- Address lack of downtown public restrooms staff plan and recommendations

### 5. Building and Zoning/Regional Plan

- Recommendations for code changes (internal staff vs external resources)
- Effort to link all documents (i.e., Regional Plan, Resource Plan, Neighborhood Plan, Zoning Codes, etc.)
- Succession plan and talent retention preparedness to keep the level of services in place capture under Administrative section

### 6. Climate Change

• Align the City's organizational structure with Council's priority of Climate Change – elevate the Sustainability division (provide tools and decision making ability)
