Kristine Pavlik, Housing and Grants Administrator will provide an overview of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and Community Development Block Grant - COVID (CDBG-CV) funds. Kristine will present the two resolutions approved by Flagstaff City Council and reallocation of general funds to Coconino County on May 19, 2020.

Staff received Council direction on funding recommendations for the use of 2020/2021 CDBG and CDBG-CV funding during the May 12, 2020, Council work session.

At the April 24, 2020, Budget Retreat City Council directed staff to move \$59,000 in the City of Flagstaff General Funds currently reserved for the Mobile Home Assistance for Displaced Residents program to the Coconino County Health and Human Services' Eviction Prevention and Housing Stabilization program.




